Mission statement:

Goals of St. Marguerite Sodality:

## History of Sodality

A Sodality is a Roman Catholic Marian Society. The primary patron of the Sodality is the Blessed Mother. Another saint is the secondary patron as a model for personal holiness for the Sodalists.

Sodalities were first founded in 1563 by a Belgian Jesuit, Jean Leunis. It began as a boys organization at the Roman College of the Society of Jesus as a devotion to Our Lady as the boys would kneel and pray to the Blessed Mother in their classrooms.

In 1751 Pope Benedict XIV opened sodalities to women. Then in 1835, St. Catherine Laboure had an apparition of the Blessed Mother and the Sodality of Children of Mary Immaculate was formed with the badge of the miraculous medal.

Besides spirituality and devotion to Our Lady, Sodalities encourage members to do corporal and spiritual works of mercy.

St. Marguerite Bourgeoys (1620–1700)

Born the sixth of 12 children in Troyes, France, Marguerite at the age of 20 believed that she was called to religious life. Her applications to the Carmelites and Poor Clares were unsuccessful.

In 1654, the governor of the French settlement in Canada visited his sister, an Augustinian canoness in Troyes.

Marguerite belonged to a sodality connected to that convent. The governor invited her to come to Canada and start a school in Ville-Marie (later became the city of Montreal). When she arrived, the colony had 200 people with a hospital and a Jesuit mission chapel.

The Congregation of Notre Dame was established in 1676 but its members did not make formal religious profession until 1698 when their Rule and constitutions were approved. By the time Marguerite died, she was referred to as the "Mother of the Colony." Marguerite was canonized in 1982.
