

> THIS WEEK IN THE PARISH

As you continue your journey through this independent study of Jesus and the Eucharist, you may want to keep a journal of your observations, thoughts and questions. Sign in or set up your account with formed.org. Search for "Jesus and the Eucharist Session 6: The Story of the Eucharist?" Watch the second half of the video, begin at 1:00:48.

The story of the Eucharist can be traced throughout Scripture from Genesis to the present day. This session explores how the Cross is the new Tree of Life and the Eucharist is the fruit.

"Now that very day two of them were going to a village seven miles from Jerusalem called Emmaus, and they were conversing about all the things that had occurred... And it happened that, while he was with them at table, he took bread, said the blessing, broke it, and gave it to them. With that their eyes were opened and they recognized him, but he vanished from their sight. Then they said to each other, 'Were not our hearts burning [within us] while he spoke to us on the way and opened the scriptures to us?" (Luke 24:13;27-33)

#### Some points made in this session of the video:

- The whole Old Testament leads up to the sacrifice of the Cross.
- In advance of the tenth plague in Egypt recounted in Exodus, God told his people to prepare themselves with a sacrifice and a meal. This sacrifice and meal inaugurated God's rescue mission. The Jewish people celebrate Passover every year to look forward to God's ultimate salvation that they believe is yet to come.
- Jesus' Bread of Life discourse in John 6 takes place around the Passover feast. Jesus came to launch a new exodus, a new rescue mission. At the Last Supper, Jesus uses the traditional Passover meal to institute the Eucharist. Jesus applies the sacrificial language of the Passover meal to himself—Jesus is the new Passover lamb.
- "This is my body, which will be given for you; do this in memory of me." (Lk 22:19) "This cup is the new covenant in my blood, which will be shed for you." (Lk 22:20) Jesus is the Lamb of God, who inaugurates the new Passover: he takes away the sins of the world, and he calls us out of our slavery to sin and death to the new Promised Land, heaven.
- At every Mass, the sacrifice of Jesus—his offering of his Body and Blood, is made present. We participate in Jesus' sacrifice by receiving his Body and Blood in the Eucharist.
- The Road to Emmaus occurs on the first day of the week; Jesus' Resurrection is the first day of a new creation.
- Jesus is tested in a garden, like Adam. But Jesus is faithful saying "not my own will, but yours be done." (Lk 22:42) Jesus is the new Adam. The new creation fulfills and surpasses the old, and the new Adam redeems the first Adam. The Cross is the new Tree of Life, and the Eucharist is its fruit. When we partake of the fruit of the Tree of Life, our eyes are opened to behold God.

#### Questions to ponder after this session:

Why do you receive the Eucharist? What do you hope for or expect when you receive the Sacrament?

How does the foreshadowing of the Eucharist in the Old Testament help you appreciate the gift of the Eucharist in your life today?

# Eucharistic Miracle of OZNAN

In the city of Poznan, in 1399, three consecrated Hosts were robbed by some desecrators who struck them with some hole-punchers in order to deface it. The Hosts began to drip blood and every attempt to destroy them proved futile. At that point, the malefactors, in order not to be discovered, decided to cast them into a marsh. But the particles were suspended in the air and began to radiate strong flashes of light. Only after fervent prayers did the bishop succeed in recovering the particles, which can be venerated today at the Church of Corpus Christi in Poznan.





























n the city of Poznan, profaners with an intense hatred for the Christian faith persuaded a domestic helper to take three consecrated Hosts from the Dominican (now Jesuit) church. The woman, enticed by a large reward, succeeded in stealing three Hosts. Immediately after they received the Hosts, the malefactors went to the basement of their mansion, put them on a table and desecrated them, beating them with a hole-puncher. Suddenly a copious amount of blood began to drip from the Particles, which splashed the face of a girl in the group afflicted with blindness, and she immediately regained her sight. The desecrators, seized with panic and anxiety, tried to destroy the Hosts, which nevertheless remained whole. Unable to rid themselves of them, they decided to take them outside the city and cast them into a marsh

in the vicinity of the Warta River. A young shepherd who happened to be passing near the marsh saw the three luminous Hosts suspended in the air. Holding back his emotions, he returned home and recounted everything to his father and the local authorities. The burgomaster was indifferent to the young man's account and ordered him to be jailed. The young shepherd managed to mysteriously escape and again presented himself to the burgomaster, who finally convinced of the facts made his way to the place of the miracle. In the meantime, the entire population had gathered around the three luminous Hosts suspended in the air. Only Bishop Wojciech Jastrzebiec, after beseeching Heaven with fervent prayers, succeeded in recovering the Particles, which descended into the pyx he held in his hands. The bishop immediately Domini church to recall the miracle.

directed that a solemn procession be formed to accompany the miraculous Hosts to St. Mary Magdalene church. At the site of the miracle, a wooden chapel was constructed which became the goal for many pilgrimages. King Wladyslaw Jagjello came to know of the miracle and made a trip to Poznan to venerate the miraculous Hosts. As a sign of devotion, the king ordered that a church dedicated to the Body of Christ (Corpus Domini) be built at the exact spot where the miracle occurred. In the 19th century, in place of the old mansion where the profanation of the Particles took place, a shrine was constructed where even today the table with the imprints from the Blood that dripped from the Hosts has been preserved. Every Thursday a procession with the Blessed Sacrament takes place at Corpus
